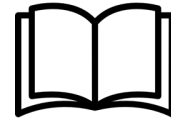

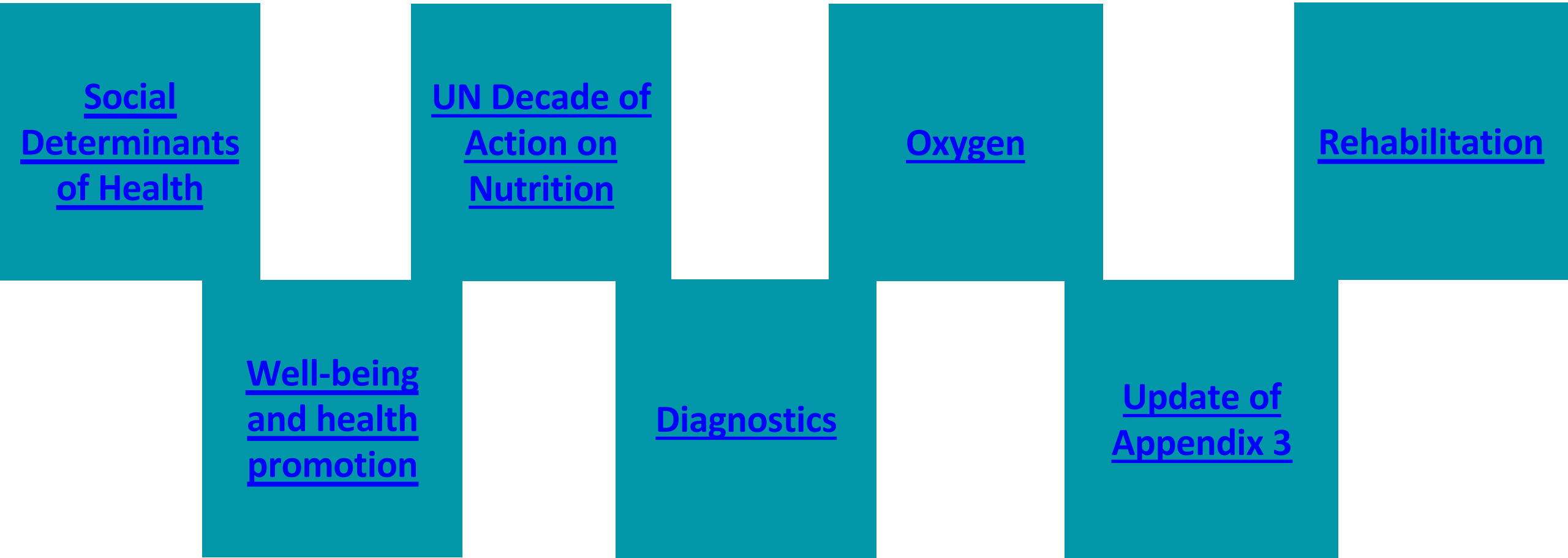

NCD Alliance's submission to the first WHO consultation on the updated Appendix 3 of the Global action plan for the prevention and control of NCDs 2013–2030
24 June 2022

1. The NCD Alliance thanks and commends the World Health Organization (WHO) for preparing the first draft of the 2022 updated Appendix 3 of WHO's Global action plan for the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) 2013–2030 (hereinafter 'Appendix 3'). This is an important step to strengthen and inform the development of WHO's Implementation road map 2023–2030 for the global action plan on NCDs, the outline for which was recently approved at the World Health Assembly.

2. Since its update in 2017, Appendix 3 became known as WHO's NCD 'best buys' and other recommended interventions given that the policy options were divided into the NCD 'best buys' [those most cost-effective and implementable according to WHO's cost-effectiveness analysis], NCD 'good buys' [those having lower but still significant cost-effectiveness], other recommended interventions based on WHO policy and guidelines without a cost-effectiveness

Key for advocating towards a strong investment case given need to consider epidemiological and impactful package of policies. *Strong, less*, the implementation of which is estimated to bring US\$ 230 billion in economic activity). This especially applies in low-income countries where the burden is highest.

Key product for governments, and effective package of NCD interventions provided by the document must support Member States across prevention, diagnosis, and treatment, that will have benefits for a wide range of people, and that WHO provides guidance on combining specific interventions.

Report by the Director-General

1. This report is submitted by the Director-General pursuant to the request in decision WHA72(11) (2019) "to consolidate reporting on the progress achieved in the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases and the promotion of mental health with an annual report to be submitted to the Health Assembly through the Executive Board, from 2021 to 2031, annexing reports on implementation of relevant resolutions, action plans and strategies, in line with existing reporting mandates and timelines".

INTRODUCTION

1. Promoting healthier populations is the third strategic priority of the WHO's Thirteenth General Programme of Work, 2018–2025, which has as its target 1 billion more people enjoying better health and well-being by the end of 2025. In order to operationalize the collective approach needed to achieve this target, known as the "Billion 3" target, in 2020 WHO developed, in consultation with partners, an implementation framework for Billion 3.
2. The Executive Board at its 150th session in January 2022 considered a report by the Director-General on WHO's implementation framework for Billion 3. During its discussion, the Board welcomed the achievements in advancing the well-being agenda, and Member States agreed to continue discussion, during the inter-sessional period leading up to the Seventy-fifth World Health Assembly, on ways to advance health promotion across different sectors.⁷
3. The Seventy-fifth World Health Assembly in May 2022 considered an update to the report of the Director-General⁸ and adopted resolution WHA75.19 on well-being and health promotion. The resolution requested the Director-General, *inter alia*, to develop – for consideration by the Seventy-sixth World Health Assembly, through the Executive Board at its 152nd session – a framework on achieving well-being, building on the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and to identify the role that health promotion plays within the framework, in consultation with Member States. It also requested, as part of the framework, the development of an implementation and monitoring plan that includes identifying and supporting the translation into practice of innovative approaches for well-being using health promotion tools, new technologies and approaches to contribute to WHO's general programme of work.



United Nations Decade of Action on Nutrition (2016–2025)

Report by the Director-General

1. This report provides an overview of the implementation of the United Nations Decade of Action on Nutrition (2016–2025), which was proclaimed in United Nations General Assembly resolution 70/259 of April 2016, based on the outcome of the Second International Conference on Nutrition (ICN2) (see resolution WHA68.19 of May 2015). The United Nations Secretary-General issued a third progress report on the Decade on 12 April 2022.¹
2. The Decade aims to achieve the global nutrition and diet related noncommunicable disease targets established by the Health Assembly in 2012 (see resolution WHA65.6) and 2013 (resolution WHA66.10) and contribute to the realization of the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030. These Health Assembly targets cover child stunting, wasting and overweight, anaemia (women aged 15 to 49), low birth weight, exclusive breastfeeding, halting the rise in diabetes and obesity, and reducing the intake of salt/sodium.
3. The effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, other health emergencies – together with the disruption of the food supply caused by intensified conflicts and climate change – impede progress towards ending hunger and malnutrition in all its forms and achieving the health-related targets of the Sustainable Development Goals.
4. Adult obesity continues to rise worldwide. More than 1.9 billion adults are affected by overweight or obesity. Nearly 3.1 billion people could not afford a healthy diet in 2020. At the same time, up to 222 million people in 53 countries or territories are expected to face acute food insecurity or worse conditions, with malnutrition remaining at critical levels.



Social determinants of health

Report by the Director-General

1. In resolution WHA74.16 (2021) on social determinants of health, the Seventy-fourth World Health Assembly requested the Director-General, *inter alia*, to report on the implementation of the resolution to the Seventy-sixth World Health Assembly in 2023, through the Executive Board at its 152nd session.
2. As predicted, the COVID-19 pandemic has increased health inequities and undermined key social determinants of health. COVID-19 mortality and morbidity within countries has disproportionately affected poorer people, marginalized ethnic minorities, including indigenous peoples, low-paid essential workers, migrants, populations affected by emergencies, including conflict, increased populations, and homeless people.² Access to COVID-19 vaccination has been very unequal. The disruption to health systems caused by the COVID-19 pandemic has reversed hard-won gains on immunization. There is increasing evidence of how the broader impacts of the pandemic have undermined previous gains in education, poverty reduction and gender equity.
3. The COVID-19 crisis is only one of many interlinked crises that the world currently faces. The climate crisis, the increasing frequency of war and conflict and the cost-of-living crisis have exacerbated – and in some cases been catalysed by – the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. These interlinked crises are also undermining key social determinants and exacerbating health inequities.
4. The Seventy-fourth World Health Assembly requested the Director-General to prepare, building on the report of the WHO Commission on Social Determinants of Health (2009) and subsequent work, an updated report on social determinants of health.
5. In response to this request, the development of the draft WHO World Report on Social Determinants of Health Equities commenced in 2021. Two advisory groups were convened to inform its development. Sixteen consultations have been held to seek input and discussions have also been undertaken with internal focal points within WHO. The report is presented in three chapters.



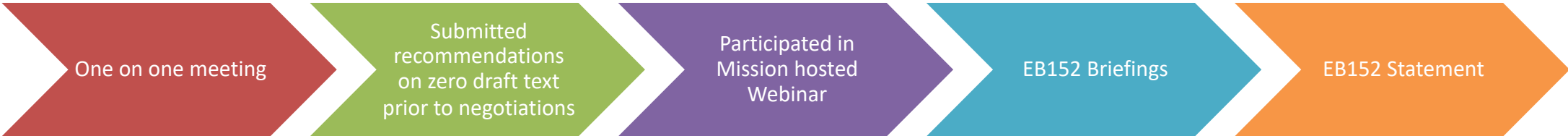

This briefing note provides background and key advocacy messages on the noncommunicable disease (NCD) relevant items on the EB152 provisional agenda (EB1522, annotated) from the NCD civil society community.

Key Message

The NCD community applauds WHO and Member States' efforts to advance global and country policy and action for the provision of the continuum of care for people living with NCDs, in line with Universal Health Coverage (UHC) principles and with a focus on Primary Health Care (PHC), through 152nd Session of the WHO Executive Board. In particular, we applaud the draft update to Appendix 3 – a menu of policy options and cost-effective interventions for the prevention and control of NCDs – and recommendations for the upcoming United Nations high-level meeting on UHC in 2023.

Strengthening rehabilitation in health systems (EB152/8)

WHO, supported by NCD Alliance and IDEF, welcomes WHO and Member State initiatives to strengthen rehabilitation services. The need is increasing with the rising prevalence of NCDs and disruption of 60% of essential rehabilitation services during COVID-19 – more than any other service. 502 million individuals globally live with stroke, experiencing physical and communication difficulties, loss of work and independence. Neuro-rehabilitation units and long-term rehabilitation are essential for health, well-being and social participation. Barriers to rehabilitation in LMICs, where NCD burden is increasing, include insufficient workforce, infrastructure, high costs and poor understanding of its role.

We call for:

- Inclusion of rehabilitation in UHC health benefit packages, within the continuum of care, enabled by guideline development, frameworks and education for patients and professionals.
- Meaningful involvement of people living with NCDs in developing policies and services, to enable cost-effective, locally relevant, and timely interventions.

Content & themes:

- #UHC is getting more spotlight (slide with hashtags).

Suggestions:

- Using personal accounts to make noise.
- Diverse visual content works best. Photos/Selfies can lure people to our content. PAA can indicate the time of messages in the rolling notes, so it is easier to rewatch and make screenshots.
- It's useful to tag relevant members and partners in the tweets around an EB.

Operations:

Small Island Developing States accelerate action to tackle big killers

18 January 2023 | News release | Barbados | Reading time: 3 min (854 words)

The Government of Barbados, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Pan American Organization are holding a high-level technical meeting on noncommunicable diseases and mental health with Small Island Developing States (SIDS). The discussion focuses on challenges, and opportunities to scale up multi-sector actions on NCDs and mental health recommendations to scale up actions that save and improve lives.

For this occasion, WHO has released a [data portal on NCDs in SIDS](#) highlighting some of the highest prevalence rates of NCD and mental health risks in the world. The data shows that over half of people in SIDS are dying prematurely from NCDs and the rate of hypertension is over 30% in almost all of the countries.

Ten of the countries with the highest rates of obesity worldwide are small island states. The highest prevalence of diabetes among adults in the world is also projected to be in SIDS. Rates of mental health conditions reach as high as 15% in the Caribbean and the Pacific.

"Countries are facing multiple overlapping crises. The climate crisis and the COVID-19 pandemic, combined with poverty, unemployment, inequality and the marginalization of minority communities are fuelling an increase in noncommunicable diseases and mental health conditions," said Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, Director-General of WHO. "To address these challenges, we need to hear from affected communities about the challenges they face and the solutions that work in diverse settings. We look forward to working with SIDS to achieve ambitious outcomes on NCDs and mental health."

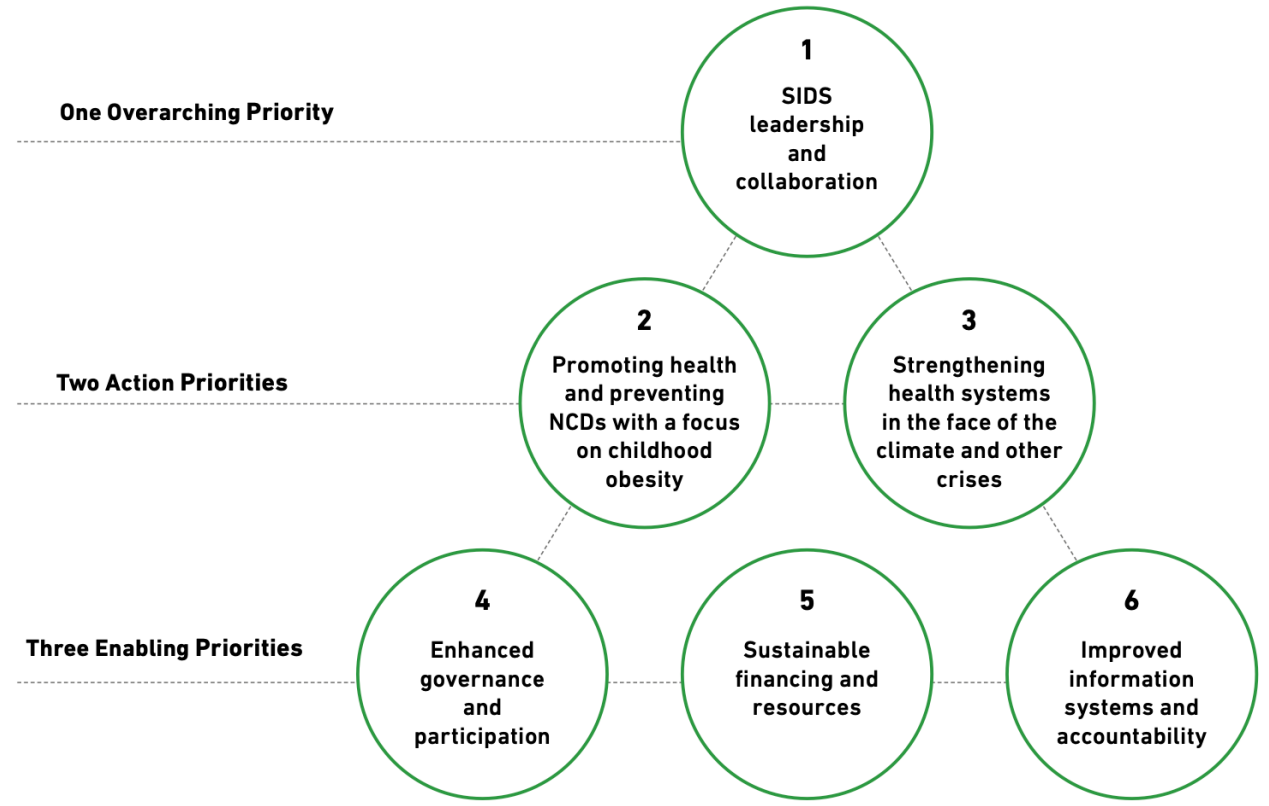

- The SIDS High Level Policy Group will be involved in the process - co-chaired by Sir George Alleyne, PAHO Director Emeritus & Sir Colin Tukuitonga, SPC Director-General
- **Further NCDA support plans:** network consultation, updated paper, SIDS mission briefing re outcome document, advocacy / activities around Ministerial Conference

- INB4 (27 Feb- 4 March) - Zero Draft



We welcome: references to individuals and groups at higher risk; commitment to equity, inclusiveness, and community engagement; health system strengthening, calls for whole of government/society approaches



Areas to strengthen: specific references to people living with NCDs and those at higher risk, where relevant; provision and access to services across the continuum of care; enhanced language around non-discrimination and access to health services
