

Second Meeting of the Intergovernmental **Negotiating Body** (INB2)




Intergovernmental Negotiating Body: 2nd Meeting (July 18 – 22)

- INB2 reviewed a working draft of the WHO Convention, Agreement or other International Instrument on Pandemic Prevention, Preparedness and Response (WHO CAII).
- The working draft is a flexible, "living" document; descriptive, not prescriptive.
- Legal implications: The INB agreed that the instrument should be legally binding and contain both legally binding as well as non-legally binding elements.
- Article 19 of the WHO Constitution is the comprehensive provision under which the instrument should be adopted.



WHO CAll working draft structure

- ✓ The preamble the core values that the WHO CAII exists to achieve
- ✓ **The vision and aspirational goals** of the WHO CAII
- ✓ Article 1 Definitions and use of terms
- ✓ Article 2 Relationship with international agreements and instruments
- ✓ Article 3 Proposed objective(s) of the WHO CAII
- ✓ Article 4 Principles that will guide the achievement of this instrument's vision and objective(s)
- ✓ Article 5 Scope of the WHO CAII
- ✓ WHO CAII calls for nationally determined and prioritised actions considering vulnerable people, places, and ecosystems. It notes that indigenous populations, refugees, migrants, persons with disabilities, children, and adolescents, may be particularly impacted by pandemics.
- ✓ There is no reference to people living underlying chronic conditions such as NCDs, despite well-correlated evidence that they are the worst hit in infectious disease outbreaks.

Dear Esteemed Board and Members of The Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria Strategy Committee,

The Global Fund strategy 2023-2028 presents a unique opportunity for the inclusion of noncommunicable disease (NCD) and co-morbidities in the organisation's programming. Due to the bidirectional relationship between NCDs, and HIV, tuberculosis (TB), and malaria, the incorporation of NCD programing could lead to improved quality of life and treatment outcomes, and to reduced premature mortality. Action now would build on the recommendations of the Global Fund Board's approval of the framework for financing co-infections and co-morbidities of HIV/AIDS, TB and malaria, as set forth in GF/B33/11, on 1 April 2015.

Given the growing focus on universal health coverage (UHC), health system strengthening and the clear evidence of NCD comorbidities with HIV/AIDS, TB, and malaria, a bold approach to **health services integration** is needed to both protect the hard-earned gains for the three diseases over the last few decades and to ensure a better quality of life for people with these diseases.



Second consultations for the update of Appendix 3

(NCD "best buys" and other recommendations)



Updating Appendix 3 - main differences between drafts 1 and 2

- Second draft continues not to use the concept 'best buys' but includes a figure that shows proportion of interventions per country income group and cost-effectiveness ratio, saying Member States can identify very good value-for-money vs. good value-for-money interventions depending on their cost threshold
- It slightly refers to the WHO acceleration plan on obesity
- It mentions that the evidence used for the modelling of interventions will be periodically revised and updated; and that a comparison across risk factors and diseases [sections] will be carried out to check consistency and differences (on methodology)
- The cost-effectiveness analysis of mass media campaign for healthy diets now includes the effect size of campaigns on fruit and vegetable intake; a cost-effectiveness analysis of unhealthy food marketing restrictions for children was added; and cost-effectiveness results on SSB taxation were updated
- **Two additional recommended interventions on CVD were added** on treatment of hypertension using single pill combination anti-hypertensives; and secondary prevention of coronary heart disease



Updating Appendix 3 - general comments (2nd round)

Urge WHO to reconsider the concept of NCD 'best buys' in the updated Appendix 3

Urge WHO to be as clear and precise as possible with the description of interventions Urge WHO to provide guidance on the synergistic benefits of combining interventions

Urge WHO to recognize within Appendix 3 that the real impact of interventions is higher

Urge WHO to provide more information on the methodology of this update



Updating Appendix 3 - other key comments

- All the WHO technical packages on NCDs should be included under their relevant sections
- WHO should divide H1 (on reformulation for healthy diets) into two interventions to accurately reflect their scope and evidence, providing Member States with specific guidance as follows:
 - H1a: "Reformulation policies for healthier food and beverage products, including by setting target levels for the amount of salt and sugars, noting that public health regulations rather than voluntary targets have been shown to be more effective."
 - H1b: "Elimination of industrially-produced trans-fats through the development of public regulations that ban their use in the food supply."
- WHO should provide further information about how the regular updating process of Appendix 3 will work and how the update processes are protected from the undue influence of health-harming industries
- WHO should clarify whether the policy options on mental health, oral health, and air pollution will be integrated as part of Appendix 3

- 1. This submission was prepared by NCD Alliance, and the following civil society organizations are co-signatories: [organization names].
- NCD Alliance and co-signatories thank the World Health Organization (WHO) for reviewing and preparing the second draft of the 2022 updated Appendix 3 of WHO's Global action plan for the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) 2013–2030 (hereinafter 'Appendix 3') – also known as the NCD 'best buys' and other recommended interventions.
- 3. In NCD Alliance's response to the first draft, we commended the strengths of the update process, such as the inclusion of cost-effectiveness results for more interventions, that results have been presented for three country income groups (low-income, lower middle-income, and upper middle-income, and that most cost-effectiveness analyses were now based on the data from 62 low and middle-income countries (LMICs), reinforcing the investment case for these interventions.
- 4. In this initial response, we also shared some reservations and several recommendations on both the methodology and content of the first draft. These included the need for more information on the methodology and its limitations; the importance to retain the concept of NCD 'best buys'; that recommended interventions should reflect the scope of their analyses; and that Appendix 3 needs to be consistent across sections and reflect the evolving NCD agenda, among other recommendations.
- 5. NCD Alliance and co-signatories welcome that the revised draft recognizes that the absence of a generalised cost-effectiveness analysis (GCEA) does not mean that other recommended interventions are not cost-effective; and that interventions that currently do not have a GCEA will be considered for such an analysis in future updates as data becomes available. However, the current draft is still unclear on some aspects of its methodology, the direction it intends to take, and the guidance it aims to provide to Member States. We therefore appreciate this second consultation opportunity and wish to contribute with the comments below.

General reservations and recommendations

6. We urge WHO to reconsider the concept of NCD 'best buys' in the updated Appendix 3. The term NCD 'best buys' and other recommended interventions has grown into a reference for the health community, being the term through which we refer to Appendix 3 for dissemination. This term flags the high return on investment of these interventions, is a basis for WHO's support on NCDs to countries and has become instrumental to advocacy. However, the concept of NCD 'best buys' – interventions that cost ≤ 1\$ 100 per disability-adjusted life year (DALY) averted in LMICS, in the 2012 version – has been omitted in the 2022 update drafts, merging all the interventions with a GCEA into one category: "Specific interventions are cost-effective, but it only says they have a GCEA.
