Introducing the Global Week for Action on NCDs

A global campaign that aims to unite the NCD movement each year under an overarching theme to act on NCDs.

The campaign aims to be an open platform to amplify the voices of the NCD movement and push governments to accelerate progress on the NCD response.

Initiated in 2018, it is open to all sorts of online and offline activities from our community. It is set to achieve four primary goals:

- 1. Raise awareness of the scale, impact and urgency of NCDs
- 2. Strengthen political commitment by governments and agencies to act on NCDs
- 3. Assert NCDs as a priority investment for health and development
- **4. Strengthen the NCD movement,** including civil society, youth and people living with NCDs to take action and demand progress.








Global Week for Action on NCDs, 5-11 September 2022 The Year of NCD Investment Invest to protect people, health systems and economies





75th World Health Assembly: NCDs louder than ever



4 take home messages:


- A call to integrate NCDs in emergency responses
- New action plan on alcohol
- Driving progress on NCDs in policy, programming and decision making: new targets and tools
- Sustainable financing: The Achilles heel of the NCD response

Key themes: link with COVID-19, mental health, PHC, surveillance, screening, multisectoral approach, wider determinants of health.



WHA75: NCD Implementation Roadmap

Key new tools:

WHA75: New Targets for Diabetes Responses

80% of people with diabetes are diagnosed

80% of people with diagnosed diabetes have good control of glycaemia

80% of people with diagnosed diabetes have good control of blood pressure

60% of people with diabetes of 40 years or older receive statins

100% of people with type 1 diabetes have access to affordable insulin treatment2 and blood glucose self-monitoring



WHA75: Driving Progress

Global Strategy on Oral Health: Guidance to build strong national responses for promotion of oral health as part of national UHC and NCD programmes

NCDs in Humanitarian Settings: Sets out recommendations for an all-hazards emergency preparedness and response approach for NCDs inc. development of an NCD health package

Cervical Cancer Progress Report: First report on implementation of global strategy to accelerate the elimination of cervical cancer. Outlines concerning disruptions caused by COVID-19



WHA75: Driving Progress

Global Action PLAN on Epilepsy and other Neurological Disorders: Neurological disorders are the leading cause of DALY's and the second leading cause of death globally. New targets and indicators.

Global Alcohol Action Plan: An increase from a 10% target reduction in "harmful use of alcohol" (from the global monitoring framework on NCDs) to 20%. A strong focus on the alcohol policy best buys and the <u>SAFER</u> initiative.

Well-being and health promotion

The Seventy-fifth World Health Assembly,

Having considered the consolidated report by the Director-General;1

Considering the vast implications that current economic, environmental and social conditions have on the health of societies, communities and people and the potential that health promotion, health protection and disease prevention have on enhancing the capacities of people to protect and improve their health and well-being, in addition to health and social measures by governments;

Reaffirming that health is a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being, and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity:

Reaffirming also, as enshrined in the WHO Constitution, that the enjoyment of the highest attainable standard of health is one of the fundamental rights of every human being without distinction of race, religion, political belieft, economic or social condition;

Further reaffirming that the objective of WHO shall be the attainment by all peoples of the highest possible level of health:

Reaffirming that governments have a responsibility for the health of their peoples, which can be fulfilled only by the provision of adequate health and social measures;

Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 70/1 (2015) on transforming our world: the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, which identified as part of the new Agenda, that to promote physical and mental health and well-being, and to extend life expectancy for all, we must achieve universal health coverage and access to quality health care, and affirmed that no one must be left behind;

Recalling also United Nations General Assembly resolution 67/81 (2012), which recognized that effective and financially sustainable implementation of universal health coverage is based on a resilient and responsive health system that provides comprehensive primary health care services, with extensive geographical coverage, including in remote and rural areas, and with a special emphasis on access to populations most in need, and has an adequate skilled, well-trained and motivated workforce, as well as capacities for broad public health measures, health protection and addressing determinants of health through policies across sectors, including promoting the health literacy of the population;

Further recalling the 2008 report of the Commission on Social Determinants of Health and the three overarching recommendations of the Commission: to improve daily living conditions, to tackle

SEVENTY-FIFTH WORLD HEALTH ASSEMBLY Agenda item 18.2 WHA75.18 28 May 2022

Outcome of the SIDS Summit for Health: For a Healthy and Resilient Future in Small Island Developing States

The Seventy-fifth World Health Assembly,

Having considered the consolidated report by the Director-General;

Noting that climate change, a persistent crisis, threatens the health of the people of all Member States, but that the populations of the small island developing States are among the first and hardest hit;

Noting also that, besides climate change, small island developing States share grave health and sustainable development challenges posed by the impacts of natural and man-made hazards, environmental degradation, health emergencies, loss of biodiversity, the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic, external economic shocks, malnutrition, noncommunicable diseases and mental health conditions:

Recognizing that small island developing States are disproportionately impacted by climate change, which undermines the progress towards their achievement of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, including Sustainable Development Goal 3 on good health and well-being.

Further recognizing that the vulnerabilities of small island developing States to extreme weather events, including natural and man-made hazards, and other external economic shocks, underscore the importance of strong and resilient health systems, underprinned by universal health coverage, that focus on equitable access, quality, as well as financial protection and financing for development in the era of COVID-19 and beyond:

Recalling United Nations General Assembly resolution 69/15 (2014), which set forth the SIDS Accelerated Modalities of Action (SAMOA) Pathway for an accelerated development plan in small island developing States, and General Assembly resolution 70/1 (2015), which adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development with the collective aim towards a transformative step for a sustainable and resilient path in ensuring that no one is left behind, and noting the correlation between high levels of vulnerability and impacts on progress towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals:

Recalling also WHO's Memorandum of Understanding with the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change in the margins of the twenty-third session of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention, and the launch of the special initiative to protect people living in small island



WHO Discussion Paper (version dated 8 June 2022)

Draft Updated Appendix 3 of the WHO Global NCD action plan 2013-2030

MANDATE

1. Paragraph 3(a) of decision WHA72(11) requested the Director-General to, inter alia

*to propose updates to the appendices of WHO's Global Action Plan for the Prevention and Control of NCDs 2013-2020 and WHO's comprehensive mental health action plan 2013-2020, as appropriate, in consultation with Member States and taking into account the views of other stakeholders, ensuring that the action plans remain based on scientific evidence for the achievement of previous commitments for the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases, including Sustainable Development Goal target 3.4 (by 2030, reduce by one third premature mortality from noncommunicable diseases through prevention and reatment and promote mental health and well-being) and other related goals and targets.

This WHO Discussion paper is prepared pursuant to this decision.

BACKGROUND

- In line with paragraph 3(a) of decision WHA72(11), the WHO Secretariat is updating the 2017 version of the Appendix 3 of the WHO Global NCD Action Plan 2013-2020, now extended until 2030, considering new scientific evidence as well as new WHO recommendations, since the 2017 update.
- 3. The WHO Global NCD Action Plan contains five appendices. Appendix 3 consists of a menu of policy options to support the implementation of the 6 objectives of the WHO Global NCD Action Plan. It outlines a list of policy options and cost-effective interventions, Member States should prioritize in order to prevent and control NCDs. The last revision of the Appendix 3 of the WHO Global NCD Action Plant' was endorsed by the World Health Assembly in 2017 (decision WHA70.11). That endorsement by WHA70, in May 2017, enabled the WHO Secretariat to include an updated Appendix 3 in the report of the UN Secretary-General to the United Nations General Assembly on NCDs of December 2017 (see paragraphs 10.15. Table 3. Table 5.3.55 S and 80 of ACT/GRG2).

Updating Appendix 3 – next steps



NCD Alliance's submission to the first WHO consultation on the updated Appendix 3 of the Global action plan for the prevention and control of NCDs 2013–2030

24 June 2022

- 1. The NCD Alliance thanks and commends the World Health Organization (WHO) for preparing the first draft of the 2022 updated Appendix 3 of WHO's Global action plan for the prevention and control of noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) 2013–2030 (hereinafter 'Appendix 3'). This is an important step to strengthen and inform the development of WHO's Implementation road map 2023–2030 for the global action plan on NCDs, the outline for which was recently approved at the World Health Assembly.
- 2. Since its update in 2017, Appendix 3 became known as WHO's NCD 'best buys' and other recommended interventions given that the policy options were divided into the NCD 'best buys' (those most cost-effective and implementable according to WHO's cost-effectiveness analysis); NCD 'good buys' (those having lower but still significant cost-effectiveness), other recommended interventions based on WHO policy and guidelines without a cost-effectiveness analysis, and overarching/enabling actions.
- 3. The concept of NCD 'best buys' and 'good buys' has been key for advocating towards countries for the implementation of NCD policies by making a strong investment case given their cost-effectiveness, and by always highlighting the need to consider epidemiological profiles and other national contexts when deciding on the most impactful package of policies. As highlighted by WHO's 2021 edition of <u>Saving lives, spending less</u>, the implementation of the NCD 'best buys' can boost national economies, generating US\$ 230 billion in economic gains by 2030 (by reducing health costs and increasing productivity). This especially applies in low and middle-income countries (LMICs) where the NCD burden is highest.
- 4. Appendix 3 must therefore be seen as a valuable knowledge product for governments, allowing them to assess what would be the most impactful and effective package of NCD interventions for their country, based on the cost-effectiveness analyses provided by the document and other national and regional factors. The document must support Member States' understanding of, and investment in a set of NCD services (across prevention, diagnosis, treatment and palliative care) and population-wide policies, that will have benefits for a wide range of NCDs and help reduce health inequalities. It is therefore crucial that the interventions included within Appendix 3 remain comprehensive and specific, and that WHO provides more guidance and examples on the synergistic benefits of combining specific interventions.
- 5. The NCD Alliance appreciates the consultation opportunity and wishes to contribute with the comments below for your consideration.





- Leverage skills in counselling for mental health across cohorts

- Bi-directional screening for TB, mental health conditions, and diabetes

- 1. Strengthening relationships across health priorities and communities
- 2. Identifying ways to strengthen local health systems
- 3. Embedding whole-of-person care at all levels in programme design

While commitments from global health initiatives to place greater focus on integrated care for priority populations and their communities is growing, understanding the practicalities of how this can be better achieved is essential if resources are to be used effectively.




High Level Political Forum (HLPF) 2022

- At the ISD2022, the President of Ghana & the Government of Norway launched 2 multi-year initiatives to accelerate the progress towards SDG 3.4 and 3.8 by 2030:
 - ✓ The Global NCD Compact 2022-2030 (Global NCD Compact) and
 - ✓ The Global Group of Heads of State and Government on Prevention and Control of NCD (NCD Presidential Group).
- The Global NCD Compact and the NCD Presidential Group will:
 - Build on the three UN High-level political declarations for the prevention and control of NCDs
 - Galvanize momentum towards the second UN High-level meeting on UHC in 2023, and the fourth UN High-level meeting on the prevention and control of NCDs in 2025.
- The first meeting of the Heads of State and Government Group will take place during UNGA 77. More to come on this!
