UN SG's Synthesis Report

- ***The Road to Dignity by 2030: Ending Poverty, Transforming All Lives and Protecting the Planet***
- **Common themes:**
 - Building on the **insufficient yet remarkable progress from MDGs**
 - Post-2015 agenda as **universal and adaptable**
 - **Addressing inequalities** in economic growth, social development
 - **Peace and rule of law**
 - **Climate change**
 - **Improving data, global partnerships, and accountability**
- **Supports 17 goals...but encourages rearranging to be more focused**

Ambition for post-2015 is “a future free from poverty and built on human rights, equality, and sustainability.”



UN SG's Synthesis Report

- **6 essential elements** aimed at guiding discussion of the goals:
 1. Dignity
 2. People
 3. Prosperity
 4. The planet
 5. Justice
 6. Partnerships
- **Reflecting on health progress:**
 - Focus on MNCH, HIV, TB, and malaria in MDGs saved millions of lives, averted preventable deaths
- **Health priorities for post-2015:**
 - UHC (access and affordability); end preventable maternal and child deaths and malnutrition; eradicate malaria, TB and AIDS; reproductive health and rights;
 - **Reduce the burden of NCDs, including mental illness, nervous system injuries; and promote healthy behaviours**



UN SG's Synthesis Report

- **NCD Alliance Response:**
 - Welcome the reference to NCDs, incl mental illness and road traffic, and emphasis on healthy behaviors
 - Endorsed Health in Post-2015 NGO group response, supporting a **strong health goal and targets**, and calling for **attention to health-related issues to achieve sustainable development**
- **Take action:**
 - **By 31 December:** Final report released in official UN languages
 - **15 January:** Deadline to submit CSO reactions to the report
 - **16 January:** CSO Stakeholder forum on post-2015 in NYC

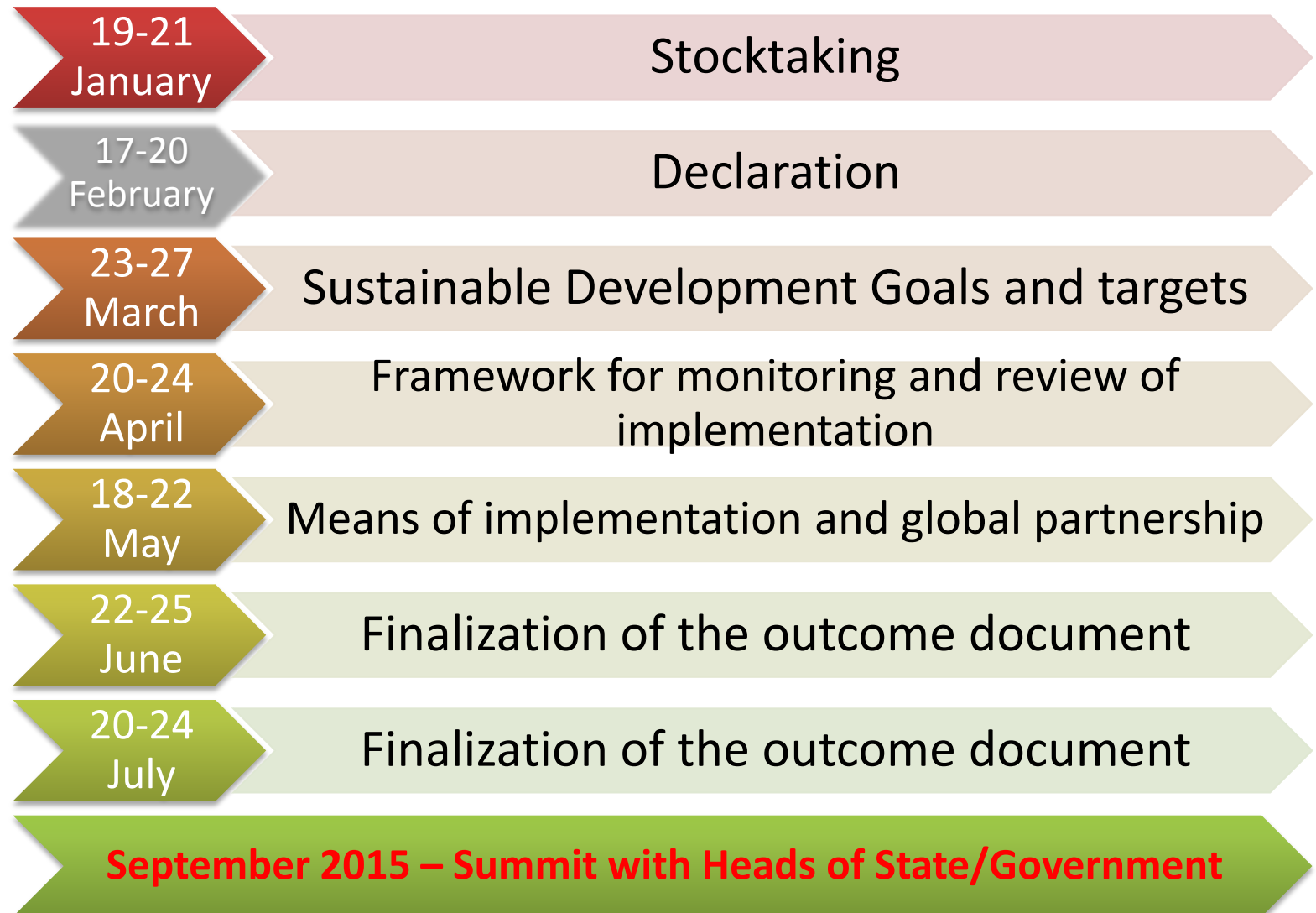
Intergovernmental Negotiations

- Modalities due to be agreed in the coming days
- Decides:
 - Negotiations will be “open, inclusive and transparent” building on OWG experience
 - Outcome document to be adopted at September 2015 Summit will include: **Declaration, goals and targets, means of implementation, and framework for monitoring and review of implementation**
 - **6 dialogues at Sept 2015 Summit** on “*Transforming the world: Realizing the post-2015 development agenda*”
 - To include **inputs from civil society** and other stakeholders

Timeline for negotiations



Intergovernmental Negotiations

Good news:

- ✓ Build on the OWG outcomes
- ✓ Clear roadmap, with ample space between for consultation
- ✓ Co-facilitators committed to timely updates

Undecided:

- ? **Technical review of targets**
- ? **Indicators**- no decision on if MS will undertake these, who should lead in developing, or the level of indicators (global vs national)
- ? **Method of civil society participation**
- ? **Themes of interactive dialogues at Summit**
- ? **Date of Zero Draft**- likely released mid-process, but no exact date
- ? **How to connect post-2015 with Financing for Development?**

NCDA advocacy for Intergovernmentals

- **New Post-2015 Advocacy Toolkit - coming soon!**
 - Resource for country-level advocates
 - Covers background information on the post-2015 process, short key asks, and steps to take action
- **Indicator Development**
 - Building on the NCD global monitoring framework
 - Consulting experts on indicator development for post-2015 agenda to ensure NCD and health indicators are included in all dimensions
- **Member State advocacy**
 - At UN HQ and through NCDA members in-country

Third International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD)

- **13-16 July 2015** in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia
- **Outcome:** A negotiated Outcome Document on financing for development, building on Monterrey and Doha
- **Objectives:**
 - Address current development financing landscape, obstacles
 - Identify new and emerging issues, as related to post-2015 agenda
 - **An opportunity to promote increased international financing for health and NCDs in context of sustainable development**
- **Preparatory process:**
 - **15 - 16 January:** Interactive hearings with CSOs and business sector
 - **27 - 29 January:** First drafting session of the outcome document
 - **Through June 2015:** Outcome Document negotiations

Third International Conference on Financing for Development (FfD)

- **Sustainable Development Solutions Network (SDSN) Report**
- Provides recommendations for the July 2015 conference:
 - Post-2015 health agenda will be much broader than the MDGs, requiring a larger public investment;
 - **Current estimated financing gap does not include NCDs**, so the actual financing need is underestimated;
 - Health sector shows how public-private partnerships can be organized, provides lessons for other sectors of the SDGs;
 - **Tobacco taxes** cited as example of innovative financing.
- **Take Action**
 - **15 January:** Deadline for SDSN report public consultation
 - **NCDA preparing a response**, will coordinate to align responses

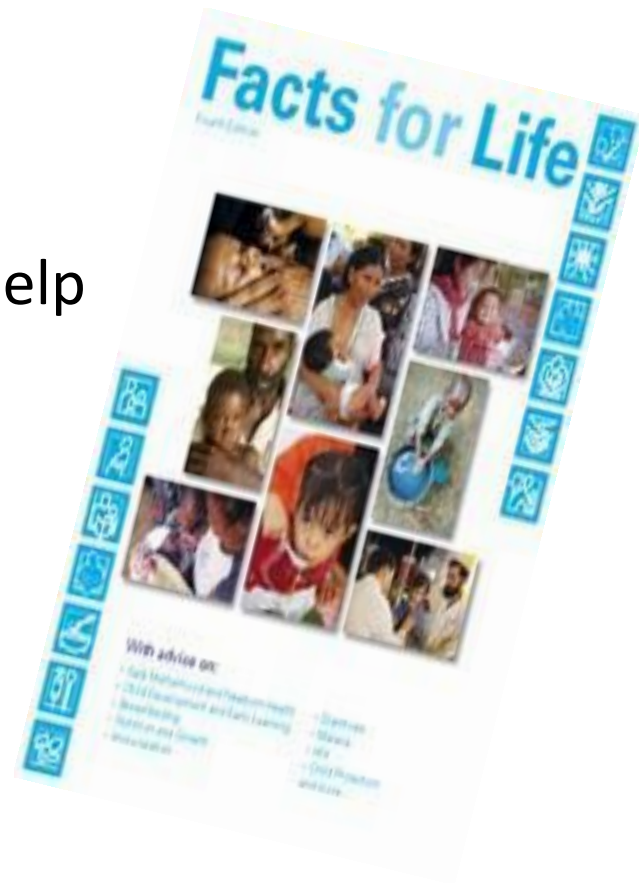

NCD Child

- 
- Global multi-stakeholder coalition, championing the rights and needs of children, adolescents, and youth who are living with, at risk of developing, or affected by NCDs.
 - American Academy of Pediatrics is the Secretariat.
 - Goals include:
 - **Advocacy** to call attention to child and adolescent NCD issues to highlight the discrepancies between the recent global commitment to a life-course approach to NCDs and current global target and indicators and key recommendations for health in post-2015 framework
 - **Education and technical support** for professional associations and civil society organizations to work with country national planning for NCDs
 - **Youth voices** elevated in the discussions about prevention, treatment, and management of NCDs

What is UNICEF *Facts for Life*?


- Provides vital messages and information for mothers, fathers, other family members and caregivers and communities to use in changing behaviors and practices that can save and protect the lives of children and help them grow and develop to their full potential
- Currently in 4th edition
- Previous versions translated into 215 languages



Why is a chapter on NCDs needed?


- Children and adolescents are affected by NCDs
- One out of ten (one million) deaths each year are caused by NCDs in people younger than 20 years of age
- Development of this chapter is part of UNICEF's contribution to the UN Global Action Plan on NCDs
- The specific aim is to provide key information, stimulate behavior change, guide community action, and influence policy and decision makers on a range of critical issues on NCDs and children

Key Themes Identified

- 
- Audience is unclear
 - Too much on prevention; not enough on management/treatment
 - Disability not adequately addressed
 - Needs more human-rights language
 - Purpose of the Chapter needs strengthening
 - Standardization of the terms “child”, “adolescents”, and “young people”
 - Highlight multi-sectoral action
 - Include primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention

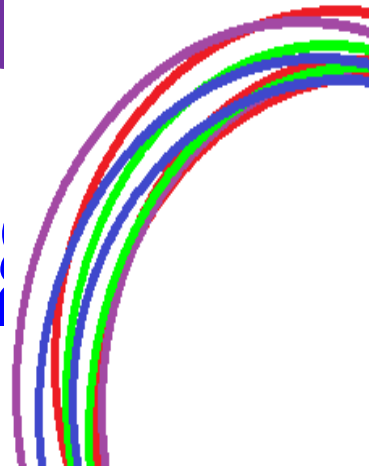

Why an ICN2: Tackle malnutrition in all its forms

- **Multiple burdens of malnutrition:** one out of every two people on the planet is **undernourished, micro-nutrient deficient, obese** or some combination of all three.
- **Aimed to bring together health and food/agriculture sectors to:**
 - 1) Assess progress made since ICN1 (1992);
 - 2) Improve policy coherence and coordination;
 - 3) Identify policy options to address nutrition challenges ahead of adoption of post-2015 development agenda.
- **ICN2 attended by 2200 participants** incl. 170 governments and HL attendees Pope Francis, the Queen of Spain, and Melinda Gates

Rome Declaration and Framework for Action



Rome Declaration:

- 10 commitments to “eradicate hunger and prevent **malnutrition in all its forms**, incl. overweight/obesity and diet-related NCDs” and create sustainable food systems through coherent public policies from production to consumption
- Recommends UNGA declare a Decade of Action on Nutrition 2016-2025

Framework for Action:

- 60 policy recommendations to implement the Rome Declaration, including the establishment of national nutrition targets (2016-2025) building on the WHA nutrition and NCD targets to monitor progress
- Recommendations inc. building sustainable food systems, actions in international trade, childhood overweight and obesity, consumer protection, and integration of nutrition objectives into UHC

Civil Society Engagement at the ICN2

- NCD community represented by Alianza ENT Chile, ACT Brazil, HCC, IDF, WHF, WCRFI and the NCD Alliance
- **Civil Society Forum 17-18 November:**
 - Historic opportunity bringing together 150 representatives from farmer's orgs, fisher folk, orgs working on hunger/food security, the 1000-day window, NCDs etc. around common goal of malnutrition in all its forms
 - Developed joint CS Declaration presented to the ICN2
 - Agreed that CS Liaison Group established in the lead-up to ICN2 will continue its work in follow-up to ICN2

NCDs at the ICN2



- **ICN2 plenary and roundtables** reflected shift in nutrition space to recognize malnutrition in all its forms, incl. overweight/obesity and NCDs
- **Inaugural Global Nutrition Report launched at ICN2:** Different, overlapping forms of malnutrition the “new normal” – NCDs rapidly growing nutrition problems worldwide.
- **ICN2 Roundtables** featured Dr. Corinna Hawkes (WCRFI) and Dr. Sania Nishtar (Heartfile)
- **Germany and Brazil hosted side event** on overweight and obesity
- Chile presented **new legislative framework for food labeling of unhealthy products** and marketing of unhealthy food to children

ICN2 Follow-up and Next Steps

Improved Governance for Nutrition

- Committee on World Food Security (CFS) discussed as preferred mechanism for ICN2 follow-up due to intergovernmental and multi-stakeholder nature
- FAO in process of establishing ***Action for Nutrition Trust Fund***

Reporting

- Ensure joint reporting by FAO/WHO governing bodies

UN General Assembly

- Discuss (and potentially endorse) ICN2 outcome documents in its 70th session; consider declaring a Decade for Action 2016-2025

Post-2015 Advocacy

- Lobby govts to integrate ICN2 commitments into nutrition goal
